GOOD MOVE: CUTTING INMATE NUMBERS GIVES COUNTY MORE TIME TO PLAN FOR JAIL NEEDS

Franklin County taxpayers have won a reprieve from spending millions of dollars to build another jail, and changes county officials have encouraged in the criminal-justice system could lead to more people straightening out their lives instead of heading back to jail. When populations at the county's two jails were bumping against capacity two years ago, county commissioners asked a consultant to study and report not only on how many more beds the county might need, but also on how the number could be reduced. Within six months, Hamilton County plans to start a veterans' court, hoping to link the more than 2,000 vets charged each year with crimes with the services at the Veteran's Administration Hospital in Corryville. OHIO PRISONS CHIEF ERNIE MOORE WANTS TO CUT NUMBER OF INMATES BY 3,000

Ohio's new prisons chief wants to reduce the number of inmates in the overcrowded system by 3,000 over three years even as the system itself forecasts continued record growth. Officials around the state need to see that the agency is addressing overcrowding, said Ernie Moore, director of the Department of Rehabilitation and Correction, which is why he set the goal of reducing the number of prisoners from 51,000 now to 48,000 by the summer of 2013. NATIONAL SURVEY REVEALS INCREASE IN SUBSTANCE USE FROM 2008 TO 2009

The use of illicit drugs among Americans increased between 2008 and 2009 according to a national survey conducted by the National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH) shows that the overall rate of current illicit drug use in the United States rose from 8.1 percent in 2008 to 8.7 percent in 2009. This rise in overall drug use was driven in large part by increases in marijuana use. The annual NSDUH survey, released by SAMHSA at the kickoff of the 21st annual National Alcohol and Drug Addiction and Abuse Awareness Month, found that the nonmedical use of prescription drugs rose from 2.5 percent of the population in 2008 to 2.8 percent in 2009. Additionally, past-month Ecstasy users rose from 555,000 in 2008 to 760,000 in 2009, and the number of methamphetamine users rose 10 percent during that period. "These results are a wake up call to the Nation," said SAMHSA Administrator Pamela S. Hyde, J.D. "Our strategy has stalled out with 'Generation Next.' Parents and caregivers, teachers, coaches, faith and community leaders, must find creative ways to talk with our youth about the dangers of substance abuse." Hard copies will be distributed in the next few weeks to domestic violence and rape crisis programs, prevention programs, and others.
