JUSTICE FOR VETS HOLDS MENTOR CORPS BOOT CAMP IN TENNESSEE

In late June, Justice For Vets was honored to conduct its first statewide Mentor Corps Boot Camp in Tennessee. This one of a kind training was made possible through the support of the Tennessee Administrative Office of the Courts and served to train 60 volunteer veteran mentors from across the state. Over the course of two days, volunteer veterans received hands on training on issues ranging from examining the roles, responsibilities and boundaries of veteran mentors; the unique issues facing combat veterans; and how to swiftly connect mentee veterans to the local, state and national services and benefits they have earned. There was strong statewide support for the training, which was attended by Tennessee Supreme Court Justice Cornelia Clark and Department of Veterans Affairs Commissioner Many-Bears Grinder, and organized by Administrative Office of the Courts Director Bill Young. REENTRY MENTORING BETWEEN YOUNG FATHERS AND THEIR CHILDREN Deadline: July 17, 2014

The FY 2014 Second Chance Act Strengthening Relationships Between Young Fathers and Their Children: A Reentry Mentoring Project helps ensure that the transition young fathers make from secure confinement facilities back to their families and their communities is successful and promotes public safety. This solicitation will fund mentoring and comprehensive transitional services, emphasizing developing parenting skills, to offenders who are young fathers. KEEPING KIDS IN SCHOOL AND OUT OF COURT

Deadline: July 21, 2014

The Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) is partnering with the Department of Education and Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration to implement a multidisciplinary initiative to improve school climates, respond early and appropriately to student mental health and behavioral needs, avoid referring students to law enforcement and juvenile justice as a disciplinary response, and facilitate a proactive and supportive school reentry process in the rare instances in which a youth is referred. The larger goal of this program is to enhance collaboration and coordination among schools, mental and behavioral health specialists, law enforcement, and juvenile justice officials at the local level to ensure adults have the support, training, and a shared framework to help students succeed in school and prevent negative outcomes for youth and communities.

This initiative includes two categories, and the eligibility differs for each component:

- Category 1: Local School Justice Collaboration Program. Applicants are limited to local juvenile and family courts (including rural and tribal juvenile and family courts) that can verify that they have a partnership—with a local education agency (LEA) that has applied to the Department of Education's School Climate Transformation Grants-LEA (SCTG) and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration Now Is the Time Project AWARE–LEA program.
- Category 2: School Justice Collaboration Program National Training and Technical Assistance. Applicants are limited to nonprofit and for-profit organizations (including tribal nonprofit and for-profit organizations) and institutions of higher education (including tribal institutions of higher education). For-profit organizations must agree to forgo any profit or management fee.

There will be 5 awards given under this program. Maximum amount per award is \$2 million.

ADDRESSING TRAFFICKING WITHIN THE CHILD WELFARE POPULATION Deadline: July 22, 2014

The Administration for Children and Families will solicit proposals for 60-month projects that will address trafficking within the child welfare population by implementing existing recommendations to prevent, identify, and serve victims of trafficking. This funding is designed to continue the development of child welfare systems; to respond to trafficking through infrastructure building, and to create an evidence base of effective interventions and practices that promote better outcomes for children involved in the child welfare system. Funded projects will be required to use a multi-system approach and coordinate with local law enforcement, juvenile justice, courts systems, runaway and homeless youth programs, Children; Justice Act grantees, child advocacy centers, and other necessary service providers. Eligibility is limited to nonprofits, for-profits, Native American tribes, colleges/universities, state governments, small businesses, special district governments, public housing authorities, school districts, and local governments. There will be \$1 million available for 4 awards.

VARIETY OF STATE JUSTICE INSTITUTE GRANTS TO IMPROVE QUALITY OF JUSTICE IN STATE COURTS

Deadline: August 1, 2014

The State Justice Institute (SJI) is announcing the availability of five grant categories for state courts, nonprofits, and educational assistance to judges. The categories are as follows:

Project Grants (up to \$300,000 each): to support innovative education and training, and demonstration and technical assistance projects, to improve the administration of justice in the nation's courts

TA Grants (up to \$50,000 each): to provide state and local courts with funding to obtain expert assistance to diagnose a problem, develop a response to that problem, and initiate implementation of any needed changes

CAT Grants (applicants are required to match not less than 50% of the grant amount requested, of which 20% must be cash): enables courts to modify and adapt or revise curriculum, train instructors, pilot test the new or revised curriculum, and conduct judicial branch education and training programs.

Partner Grants: allows SJI and federal, state, local, and private entities to combine financial resources in pursuit of common interests

ADDRESSING YOUTH OUTCOME INEQUALITY

Deadline: August 5, 2014

The William T. Grant Foundation funds research to inform programs, policies, and practices to reduce inequality in youth outcomes. Some studies may examine approaches that improve outcomes for all youth, but can reduce gaps if applied to those who need them most. Others may identify programs, policies, and practices aimed at elevating the most disadvantaged young people. The Foundation encourages descriptive studies meant to clarify the leverage points or mechanisms that should be addressed in future work. In addition, they are interested in studies that improve the measurement of inequality in ways that will enhance the work of researchers, practitioners, or policymakers. The Foundation is interested in reducing inequality across the entire spectrum—not just for the least fortunate. For example, their inequality agenda includes middle-class families who are increasingly challenged to provide resources to support their children's advancement, particularly when it comes to college tuition. Moreover, their interest is in elevating outcomes for those who have been underserved, not in diminishing outcomes for those who have been successful in the past. Applicant must be employed at a taxexempt organization. Funds must primarily support research activities, not intervention or service costs. The research project must have compelling relevance for programs, policies, and practices affecting youth ages 5-25 in the United States. enforcement as a disciplinary response, and facilitate a proactive and supportive school reentry process in the rare instances in which a youth is referred. OJJDP's announcement has two components: One provides support to juvenile and family courts to partner with schools and law enforcement. The second will provide for technical assistance to the courts and other stakeholders working to reform discipline policy and practice.
