NEW HISPANICS AND LATINOS IN DRUG COURTS: CULTURAL STRATEGIES TO ENHANCE AND SUSTAIN RECOVERY

Date: Friday, May 5, 2017 @ 1:00 PM – 2:30 PM ET

The rates of incarceration for low level crimes committed by Hispanic and Latino drug offenders in the US are staggering. One in four federal prison inmates is a Latino. In four states, Latino youth under the age of 18 are incarcerated at adult facilities at rates between 7 and 17 times greater than those of Caucasian youths. Practitioners in drug courts deal with Hispanic male 'machismo attitudes' and distrust of the 'system,' or that young Latinas have high rates of trauma not always recognized and addressed.

This webinar will provide a review of the scope of the problem that varies throughout the states and how cultural humility principles can be integrated to work with participants' cultural perspectives to support and sustain their recovery process. To provide practitioners with culturally informed processes that can augment their skill sets and consequently outcomes for Hispanic and Latino drug court participants.

NEW MOTIVATIONAL INTERVIEWING

Date: May 18-19, 2017 from 9:00am – 4:00pm

Location: Quest Conference Center, Columbus, Ohio

One of the key elements of probation and parole is to help facilitate change in offenders. Despite the severity of the consequences thy face, all offenders begin at different levels of readiness to change their behaviors. Some offenders may have been thinking about making a behavior change, but may not yet have taken the steps to make that change themselves. Alternatively, of the offenders may have been actively trying to change their behavior unsuccessfully for years.

Research shows that forced changes rarely last. By using Motivational Interviewing (MI), officers can engage and enhance the internal motivation within offenders and guide them toward lasting behavior change in non-confrontational and non-adversarial way. A Motivational Interviewing approach seeks to help offenders think differently about their behavior and ultimately to consider what might be gained through change.

COMPREHENSIVE OPIOID ABUSE SITE-BASED PROGRAM FY 2017

Application Deadline: April 25, 2017

Signed into law on July 22, 2016, the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA) is the first major federal substance use disorder treatment and recovery legislation in 40 years and the most comprehensive effort to address the opioid epidemic. CARA establishes a comprehensive, coordinated, and balanced strategy through enhanced grant programs that expand prevention and education efforts while also promoting treatment and recovery. The Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Site-based program was developed as part of the CARA legislation. The purpose of the Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Site-based Program is to provide financial and technical assistance to states, units of local government, and Indian tribal governments to plan, develop, and implement comprehensive diversion and alternatives to incarceration programs that expand outreach, treatment, and recovery efforts to individuals impacted by the opioid epidemic who come into contact with justice system. A separate competitive Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Training and Technical Assistance (TTA) solicitation will be posted during the first quarter of FY 2017. The TTA program is designed to complement the site-based competitive solicitation. The Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Site-Based Grant Program (COAP) consists of six different grant program categories.

Category 1: Overdose Outreach Projects

Supports innovative programs and new approaches to connecting an overdose survivor to services.

Supports technology-assisted treatment projects, in up to three states, to demonstrate how

Category 3: System-level Diversion and Alternatives to Incarceration Projects

Supports development of county-based approaches to diversion and alternatives to incarceration.

Eligibility: Units of local government and federally recognized Indian tribal governments

Project Period: Up to 36 months

Dollar Amount: No greater than \$400,000

Category 4: Statewide Planning, Coordination, and Implementation Projects

Supports statewide planning, coordination, and implementation projects.

Eligibility: State Administering Agency or the State Alcohol and Substance Abuse Agency

Project Period: Up to 24 months

Dollar Amount: First subcategory of funding is up to \$100,00 for 24 months. The second

Subcategory of funding is up to \$750,000 for 24 months.

Category 5: Harold Rogers Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP) Implementation and

Enhancement Projects

Supports implementation and enhancement of PDMPs

Category 6: Data-driven Responses to Prescription Drug Misuse

Supports bringing together stakeholders and different sets of information to create a holistic response to prescription drug misuse.

NEWCOMPREHENSIVE ASSISTANCE FOR THE HOMELESS

Application Deadline: April 25, 2017

This Department of Health and Human Services program supports community infrastructures that integrate behavioral health treatment and services for substance use disorders and co-occuring mental and substance use disorders, permanent housing, and other critical services for individuals and families experiencing homelessness. Eligibility is limited to state/tribal/local governments, colleges and universities, and nonprofits. There will be \$9.5 million available for 24 awards.

NEW OJJDP FY 2017 JUVENILE DRUG TREATMENT COURT PROGRAM Application Deadline: May 2, 2017

OJJDP envisions a nation where our children are healthy, educated, and free from violence. If they come into contact with the juvenile justice system, the contact should be rare, fair, and beneficial to them. To meet this vision, this program will support juvenile drug treatment courts (JDTCs) in implementing system changes, service delivery, and programming enhancements that are aligned with OJJDP's JDTC Guidelines, which were released in 2016. The new guidelines provide juvenile courts with an evidence-based, treatment-oriented approach that emphasizes family engagement and addresses the substance use and often co-occurring mental health challenges experienced by youth. Successful applicants will be expected to work with OJJDP's training and technical assistance provider to align their activities with the JDTC Guidelines and participate in research and evaluation activities that will be conducted by an independent evaluator, funded by OJJDP.
