FACULTY BIOGRAPHIES

HON. JOYCE A. CAMPBELL has been a Judge for the Fairfield Municipal Court since 1999 and has presided over a specialized mental health court docket since 2001 and an OVI (drug and alcohol) docket since 2008. Prior to that she served as a prosecutor, a trial attorney, an arbitrator and mediator, and a police professional. Judge Campbell received her Bachelor of Arts in Psychology and Sociology from Case Western Reserve University and her Juris Doctorate from Case Western Reserve University School of Law (cum laude). Judge Campbell has performed community service as a member of many boards and clubs, including the Children's Diagnostic Center Board of Directors Inc., the Fairfield Fair Housing Board, Butler County Mental Health Board (President 2004-2005), Former President of the Association of Municipal/County Judges of Ohio and was on the Board of Trustees for the Ohio Judicial College. Currently, Judge Campbell is a member of the Fairfield Rotary Club, Fairfield Women, Ohio Farm Bureau, Commission on Specialized Dockets, Chair of the Ohio Judicial Conference Judicial Education Committee, Co-Chair of the Ohio Judicial Conference Criminal Law and Procedure Committee, Co-Chair of the Ohio Judicial Conference Specialized Courts Committee, Board of Trustees for NAMI of Ohio, Co-Chair of the Subcommittee on Mental Health Courts for the Attorney General's Taskforce on Criminal Justice and Mental Illness, the Supreme Court of Ohio Commission on the Rules of Superintendence and ASTAR (Advanced Science and Technology Adjudication Resource) Fellow. Judge Campbell is admitted to practice law in Ohio and Kentucky, the U.S. District Courts – Southern and Northern Districts of Ohio, and the U.S. Supreme Court.

HON. THERESA DELLICK has been the Mahoning County Juvenile Judge since 2001, prior she was a county court judge and a partner in a law firm. She received her JD in 1983 from the University of Toledo. She is currently Vice Chair of the Specialized Dockets Commission and District Five Trustee of the OAJCJ. She is past president of the OAJCJ. The Court has six specialty dockets addressing specific needs. Judge Dellick also created a school for expelled/drop-out students. Since 2008, over 200 students have graduated with a high school diploma. The school has been recognized by the White House for innovativeness. The Court has also created an Early Warning System that is adopted by several school districts in the county aimed at decreasing truancy. Judge Dellick has assisted with drafting juvenile related issue legislation and testifying before the legislature. She is a national and statewide presenter on various juvenile topics. She is the recipient of many national and state awards and honors.

RONYA HABASH-LEWIS was born in Akron, Ohio and graduated from Ellet High School in 2003. After graduating high school she traveled to Jerusalem where she lived for about a year before returning to Akron to attend college. She graduated from the University of Akron with both an Associate in Criminal Justice in 2009 and Bachelors in Political Science/Criminal Justice in 2010.

Upon graduating Ronya worked in Summit County Probate court. In 2012 she started her career path as a Probation Officer for the Barberton Municipal Court. She specialized in driving under suspension cases and assisting people get their license back through the Barberton Municipal Court's SLIP program. Two years in to her Probation Officer profession she started working for Summit County Court of Common Pleas Probation. Ronya took over as the Probation Officer for the Summit

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County Felony Drug Court also known as 'Turning Point' in June of 2015 and has maintained that position since. Working with the growing population struggling with addiction has always been Ronya's passion for various reasons.

ALICIA FEEHERY WOLF, J.D. is Policy Counsel for the Specialized Docket Section of the Supreme Court of Ohio, responsible for reviewing applications for certification of adult and juvenile drug courts, mental health courts, family dependency courts, and other specialized dockets. Alicia is also policy counsel for the Statewide System Reform Program, a grant initiated by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) to establish a comprehensive strategy for statewide multisystem reform that improves outcomes for children and families in the child welfare system with substance abuse and mental health challenges. Prior to joining the Specialized Section, Alicia was Case Management Counsel with the Case Management Section of the Supreme Court of Ohio. As Case Management Counsel, Alicia provided analysis and assistance to courts regarding case flow management, delay reduction and operations management. Alicia started her legal career as counsel for Franklin County Children Services, representing the agency in permanency hearings. Additionally, Alicia served as a Magistrate in the Delaware County Court of Common Pleas for ten years, presiding over non-jury trials, criminal arraignments, evidentiary hearings, and other hearings in civil and domestic cases. Alicia received her B.A. in Government from the University of Notre Dame and her J.D. from Capital University.

C. BRIAN CLUBB, J.D. is the coordinator for the Military & Veterans Advocacy Program of the Battered Womens Justice Project. He manages a special project to develop a model coordinated community response to intimate partner violence where perpetrators have co-occurring combat-related conditions, such as PTSD and/or TBI. He also is responsible for maintaining and expanding a network of subject matter experts to serve as resources for victim advocates serving military-related and military victims. He is a former deputy public defender and private attorney, having worked in the Santa Clara County (CA) Drug Treatment and Domestic Violence Court programs, and was the first Veterans Treatment Court Project Director for the National Association of Drug Treatment Court Professionals. Mr. Clubb is a retired Marine Corps officer serving over twenty years on active duty and in the reserves.

HON. PEGGY D. DAVIS is the Drug Court Commissioner for Greene County, Circuit Court, 31st Judicial Circuit Springfield. She assumed this position in August 2000. She has served as a Public Defender for the State of Missouri, an Assistant Prosecutor for Greene County and as an Assistant Prosecutor for the City of Springfield. She also practiced general civil law with Woolsey Fisher Whitaker and McDonald in Springfield, MO. She received her Bachelor of Arts Degree from the University of Oklahoma in 1985. In 1988, she received her Juris Doctorate from Oklahoma City University School of Law.

JOHN L. EADIE is the Public Health & Prescription Drug Monitoring Program Project Coordinator for the National Emerging Threat Initiative of the National HIDTA Assistance Center. He previously served as Director of the Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP) Center of Excellence at Brandeis University (2010-15). For 44 years, Mr. Eadie has served in management, executive and consulting capacities in the field of public health. As Director of the Division of Public Health Protection in the New York State Department of Health (1985-95), he directed the

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state's pharmaceutical diversion program, including the PDMP. He co-founded both the Alliance of States with Prescription Monitoring Programs (ASPMP) and the National Association of State Controlled Substances Authorities (NASCSA), served as President for both organizations and held other posts. Since leaving New York state service in 2001, Mr. Eadie has served as a consultant on PDMPs, including serving as the Administrative Reviewer for the Massachusetts PDMP. Mr. Eadie has published multiple articles, made numerous presentations, and served in many different arenas as an expert.

HELEN HARBERTS, M.A., J.D. served 25 years in public safety as both a prosecutor and a Chief Probation Officer. She serves on the faculty of the National Drug Court Institute, and many other justice related agencies. She is the author of the Community Supervision chapter in the NDCI Drug Court Judicial Benchbook, and has helped to design curricula for the Community Supervision Practitioners Training, and the Guiding Principles of DWI Courts. In addition, for five years her practice of law was exclusively in problem solving courts. She trains nationally on various topics associated with problem solving courts.

TRACY HAYES offers 15 years' experience with and knowledge about Ohio Medicaid. She serves, currently, as a contract administrator for an Ohio Medicaid managed care plan. Tracy served, eight years, in the Medicaid Eligibility Technical Assistance and Compliance unit at ODM before joining the Bureau of Managed Care. Tracy also enjoyed several years' service as a Total Case Manager for the Franklin County Department of Job and Family Services, and as a community health worker, in Franklin County, during the Ohio SCHIP expansion. Tracy earned undergraduate degrees in Communications and Social Science, and a Master's degree in Public Administration from Ohio University; she is also Lean Six Sigma Green Belt Certified.

HON. PAUL HERBERT created a special Human Trafficking Court at the Franklin County Municipal Court where individuals charged with committing a commercial sex are offered intense social services and probation in order to exit this viscous and often deadly life. The CATCH (Changing Actions To Change Habits) Program was started in September 2009 and sets the standard for specialized trafficking dockets in Ohio. It has also been recognized both nationally and internationally as a pioneering restorative justice effort changing the legal, law enforcement, political, and social culture in Ohio. The results have been nothing short of miraculous. Women now have a safe path to exit this vicious lifestyle, they are being reunited with their families, not committing new offenses, furthering their educations and giving back to the community in significant ways. Judge Herbert continues to speak locally and nationally educating audiences regarding this endemic social problem. Judge Herbert has been practicing law for 27 years and is a graduate of The Ohio State University and Capital University Law School. After a brief time in private general practice Judge Herbert joined the staff of the Franklin County Prosecutor's Office and served as a trial attorney. In 1991 he became the Chief of Staff for the Franklin County Municipal Court Clerk's Office. In 1996 he assumed the role of Clerk of Court where he spent the next 7 years before being elected Judge in 2003. Judge Herbert was re-elected to that position in 2009. While serving as a Judge, he proposed and ultimately implemented the specialized CATCH Court Program focusing on Human Trafficking.

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DR. DOUGLAS B. MARLOWE, J.D. is Chief of Science, Law and Policy for the National Association of Drug Court Professionals (NADCP). Dr. Marlowe is responsible for translating the latest scientific findings into useful and understandable practice and national policy, addressing legal issues facing the drug court model and expanding NADCP's role in the full problem-solving court arena.

Dr. Marlowe is an Adjunct Associate Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine and former Director of the Division of Law & Ethics Research at the Treatment Research Institute (TRI). A lawyer and clinical psychologist by background, Dr. Marlowe has received numerous state and federal research grants to study the role of coercion in drug abuse treatment, the effects of drug courts and other specialized programs for drug-abusing offenders, and behavioral treatments for drug abusers and criminal offenders. He is a Fellow of the American Psychological Association (APA) and has received proficiency certification in the treatment of psychoactive substance use disorders from the APA College of Professional Psychology. He has published over 100 professional articles and chapters on the topics of crime and drug abuse and is on the editorial boards of the journals, the *Drug Court Review* and *Criminal Justice & Behavior*.

BRIAN L. MEYER, PH.D. is the Interim Associate Chief of Mental Health Clinical Services, Supervisory Psychologist, and Substance Abuse/Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder Specialist at the H.H. McGuire Veterans Administration Medical Center and an Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychiatry at Virginia Commonwealth University. He obtained his A.B. from Harvard University and his Ph.D. in clinical psychology from Duke University. Dr. Meyer has worked in the child welfare and the child and adult mental health fields as a clinician, administrator, teacher, policy maker, program developer, and researcher. Throughout his career, Dr. Meyer has worked with people who have experienced trauma, and his clinical expertise is in treating trauma and its co-morbid disorders. In his current roles, Dr. Meyer oversees multiple mental health initiatives for veterans and their families; provides evidence-based treatments for veterans who have problems with PTSD, substance abuse, depression, TBI, and other co-occurring conditions; and conducts research on treatments for veterans with PTSD. Dr. Meyer is a nationally-known speaker on a wide range of content areas including the treatment of trauma and co-morbid conditions, the effects of trauma on families, veterans' mental health, mindfulness meditation, and collaborative courts.

JANE E. PFEIFER, M.P.A. currently serves as Senior Program Associate at Children and Family Futures. In this role, Ms. Pfeifer leads the Family Drug Court Mentor Court Project and the Family Drug Court Guidelines Project, and provides training and technical assistance to jurisdictions across the U.S. Previously she has worked in the justice system, focusing on systems improvement and collaborative justice.

As a consultant, Ms. Pfeifer has worked with public and private organizations providing training and technical assistance, grant writing and community resource development. Ms. Pfeifer has served as faculty to national organizations including the National Judicial College, the National Development and Research Institutes, the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges, the National Drug Court Institute and the Justice Management Institute. She is also currently an adjunct professor at California State University—Chico in the Department of Political Science. Ms. Pfeifer holds Bachelor's Degrees in Social Work and Psychology, and a Master's Degree in Public Administration.

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KENNETH ROBINSON, ED.D. is one of the most respected teachers and lecturers on cognitive-behavioral treatment and correctional counseling. Robinson, President of Correctional Counseling, Inc., and Executive Editor of Cognitive-Behavioral Treatment Review, has published and presented numerous professional articles in the areas of psychopharmacology and mental health services and is co-developer of MRT-Moral Reconciliation Therapy®. He is a familiar speaker at both national and international symposiums and conferences, including the National Judicial College, National Association of Drug Court Professionals, and American Probation and Parole Association among other organizations. He has also been asked to testify before legislative bodies on the efficacy and value of cognitive-behavioral treatment programs that can reduce recidivism, enhance public safety and lower costly incarceration expenses.

Dr. Robinson's extensive work in mental health and corrections provide a unique combination of insight and expertise. While Director of Clinical Services for Midtown Mental Health Center in Memphis, Tenn., he established the first Crisis Stabilization Unit for the city and was featured in Memphis Magazine's article "The Crisis in Mental Health Care" in January 1987. He is also no stranger to the rigorous demands of working with offenders behind the bars, having worked in mental health services for the Shelby County Correction Center for 12 years, as well as the State Regional Prison in Memphis, before founding Correctional Counseling, Inc. He is currently a faculty member of the National Judicial College and has served as a consultant with the U.S. Bureau of Justice, the National Association of Drug Court Professionals, and the National Institute of Corrections. Dr. Robinson also has extensive experience with therapeutic programs in correctional settings. Professional colleagues describe Dr. Robinson as determined to design and implement the most effective programs to help those individuals desiring and willing to change their lives.

STEVEN W. SCHIERHOLT, ESQ. serves as the Executive Director of the State of Ohio Board of Pharmacy. He is responsible for administering all orders of the Board as well as directing agency operations. Steve has more than 35 years of experience in law enforcement and agency administration. Prior to joining the Board, he was the Assistant Superintendent of the Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) at the Ohio Attorney General's Office. In that position, he oversaw all operations of the Bureau including the unprecedented reduction in the average DNA evidence processing time from 125 days to 22 days.

From 2004 - 2007, Schierholt served the Executive Director of the Ohio Peace Officer Training Commission. During his tenure, he managed the complete remodel of the Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy campus in London, Ohio. Steve also lobbied for and secured passage of an Ohio law requiring continuing education for law enforcement officers, a first step in what is now of statewide and national focus.

Schierholt, a U.S. Army Veteran, also served as an Assistant Attorney General, BCI Special Agent, Adjunct Professor of Criminal Justice, Deputy Sheriff with the Auglaize County Sheriff's Office and Assistant Franklin County Prosecutor.

Throughout his career, Steve has served on many committees and boards, notably the FBI's Violent Criminal Apprehension Program (ViCAP) National Advisory Board, National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) Ohio Board of Trustees, as the Chairman of the Association of State Criminal Investigative Agencies (ASCIA) Technology Committee. He currently serves on the International Association of Chiefs of Police Investigative Operations Committee and the National Association

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of Boards of Pharmacy Committee on Law Enforcement/Legislation. A native of Lima, Steve is a graduate of Elida High School and received his undergraduate degree and Juris Doctorate from Capital University.

SOUDER TATE, J.D. is a criminal defense attorney and sentencing mitigation advocate in Springfield, Missouri. He was admitted to the bar in 1985 and served as an elected prosecuting attorney from 1986 until 1990. Souder has volunteered as a defense representative on treatment courts for over seven years. He sits on the board of directors for the Missouri Association of Treatment Court Professionals and for the Missouri Continuing Education Consortium and has spoken at conferences for both organizations. Souder received a B.A. in Creative Writing from Missouri State University (1982) and a J.D. from the University of Missouri-Columbia (1985).

ROBIN R. TENER, PH.D. is a Licensed Clinical Psychologist and the Executive Director of Northeast Ohio Behavioral Health, Ltd. (NEOBH). Dr. Tener has over 25 years of experience working with children, adolescents and families in forensic situations, including child sexual abuse investigations, parental fitness evaluations, custody assessments and post-divorce visitation conflicts. Dr. Tener is frequently utilized by Juvenile, Domestic Relations, Criminal and Family Court as an expert witness in the area of child trauma and has presented numerous workshops to attorneys, law enforcement personnel, mental health professionals and child protective agencies regarding specialized assessment issues and the integration of data regarding trauma exposure.

In addition to her work with NEOBH, Dr. Tener is the Community Outreach Coordinator for the National Child Traumatic Stress Network (NCTSN) grant that was awarded to Akron Children's Hospital in 2012. This SAMSHA-funded grant initiative provides leadership, training and consultative services in the area of childhood trauma, as well as resources that will improve access to trauma-informed care in the community. Dr. Tener continues to work on the extension of this grant project.

Within her role as Community Outreach Coordinator, Dr. Tener has additionally assisted with the development of trauma-informed systems of care in Child Welfare, Juvenile Justice, Schools and other child-serving agencies and systems in communities throughout the target region surrounding the campuses of Akron Children's Hospital. Projects related to identifying and managing Secondary Traumatic Stress via resiliency skill-building have been developed within a number of organizations in order to introduce trauma-informed practices that modify the way in which organizations respond to individuals impacted by traumatic life events.

JUSTIN J. TREVINO, M.D. was born in Columbus, OH, grew up in the Dayton, OH area and has been a nearly lifelong resident of Ohio. He graduated college from Trinity University (San Antonio, TX) with a BA in Chemistry. He graduated medical school from Wright State University/ Boonshoft School of Medicine in Dayton Ohio in 1987. He trained as a resident in psychiatry at the Institute of Living Hospital (Hartford, CT) for two years and completed residency training in the Wright State University Department of Psychiatry Residency Program in 1991.

Dr. Trevino has served patients in a number of Ohio hospitals and communities, providing both psychiatric and addiction services to patients. His roles have included both clinical and administrative

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duties in a variety of settings: inpatient/ partial hospital/ outpatient mental health, private practice, addiction treatment facilities- inpatient/residential/ outpatient/ methadone clinic, and managed care settings. He has served in the role of Chief Clinical Officer for a mental health and recovery board as well as serving as a board member for his local mental health and recovery board for a 5 year period.

Dr. Trevino was the Assistant Chief Clinical Officer at Twin Valley Behavioral Healthcare (TVBH)- Dayton for six years and served in the roles of Assistant Chief Clinical Officer and Chief Clinical Officer- Director of Clinical Services at TVBH- Columbus for four years. He was named Assistant Medical Director for the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services in October 2015.

Dr. Trevino is certified by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology in Psychiatry (lifetime certification) and Addiction Psychiatry (recertified in 2014). He is a distinguished Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and a Clinical Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Health at The Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center.

TERRENCE D. WALTON, MSW, CSAC, Chief Operating Officer for the National Association of Drug Court Professionals (NADCP), is among the nation's leading experts in providing training and technical assistance to drug courts and other problem-solving courts. Previously, Mr. Walton was Director of Treatment for the Pretrial Services Agency for the District of Columbia in Washington, D.C. Before that he excelled as the director of what was then the District of Columbia's leading adolescent outpatient substance abuse treatment center. Mr. Walton is licensed substance abuse counselor with over 25 years of experience helping individuals and organizations champion positive change. He holds a bachelor's in psychology and a master's of social work with specializations in program administration and substance abuse. A gifted and entertaining speaker, Mr. Walton travels extensively informing and inspiring audiences across the globe.

MICHELE WOROBIEC, ESQ. is Policy Counsel for the Supreme Court of Ohio where she engages in judicial education and policy work at the state and federal levels to support specialized dockets. Current projects include establishing principles to effectively address opiate addiction in the criminal justice system, developing trauma competent courts, and identifying the prevalence of human trafficking victims in drug courts.

Prior to coming to the Supreme Court, Michele spent seven years on the bench as an acting judge and magistrate for the Marion Municipal Court and led the statewide provision of judicial services for the Ohio Judicial Conference. Before entering public service, Michele practiced law at the firm of Kegler, Brown, Hill & Ritter. She is a graduate of The Ohio State University where earned both a bachelor of science in psychology, summa cum laude, and her juris doctor from the Moritz College of Law.

Michele is a frequent presenter for numerous organizations, including the National Association of Drug Court Professionals, Ohio Judicial College, Ohio Common Pleas Judges Association, Association of Municipal and County Court Judges of Ohio, Ohio Association of Magistrates, Ohio State Bar Association, Ohio Justice Alliance for Community Corrections, and the Ohio Psychological Association.
